Living a zero waste lifestyle may not be practical for most people—but that doesn't mean you can't make small changes in your daily life. One place to start is in the kitchen. Here are a few things to keep in mind, followed by some easy swaps below:

—Don't buy reusable items unless you're actually going to reuse them. Reusable doesn't necessarily = sustainable.

—Plastic bags don't have to be single-use. I've found plastic freezer bags to be pretty sturdy and can be used multiple times to store frozen food. Just rinse by hand and air-dry.

—Instead of using aluminum foil or plastic wrap to preserve leftovers, go retro: Cover the bowl with a plate. Works like a charm.

—Don't microwave your meals in plastic containers. Many plastics contain harmful chemicals that leach into your food and can harm your brain, liver, and reproductive system. Heat aids the process, so opt for glass instead.



These are super absorbent, great for cleaning and can be thrown in the washer. They're also a good alternative to microfiber cloths, which clean well but shed microplastics.
